WRAP IT UP:

God created us by His will...for His purposes! But man disobeyed God, and He gave them over to slavery to sin, and they lived in the domain of darkness, under Satan's rule.

However, God planned and carried out redemption for mankind through His Son, Jesus. Jesus redeemed mankind by paying the price of death for sin that mankind deserved. In exchange, those who believe in the gospel have forgiveness of sins and escape the domain of darkness.

And our response today should be one of thankfulness, of gratitude and absolute awe and wonder at the great love God has shown in his son Jesus' sacrifice for us. Will you, one who is created for Him, bend the knee today? Will you bow in worship for what He has done for us?

11 “Worthy are You, our Lord and our God, to receive glory and honor and power, for You created all things, and because of Your will they existed, and were created.”

Colossians 1:13-17 ESV

13 He has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son,

14 in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

15 He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation.

16 For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through him and for him.
